

Two (2) important bills are being introduced again - the infamous Liability bill (relieving design professionals from being personally sued) -- Bill 288 (Negron), which we support, and the CCNA Bill 276 (Bennett) - relating to procurement of professional services (CCNA - oppose). Your involvement is important in ensuring these bills are processed as we need them to be.

The FES Board also meets in Tallahassee, and has many items on their agenda. The PDH hours are back for their action, as well as the Structural Engineer licensure items. In addition, more good news of the legal system securing your wallets for work done, or not done, beyond your control on old projects. More information on this item at the E-Week Banquet, along with an update on the State Board Meeting. I will be in Fernandina Beach the morning of the banquet, presenting a paper at the AIA Florida Board Meeting. I will be back for the dinner, though. The Task Force paper for Building Officials Guide to Architects and Engineering responsibilities is close to being released. That Task Force is now working on a Drawing Checklist (Civil, Structural, Architectural, Mechanical, Electrical, Plumbing, etc.) for what a complete drawing design package should include. Anyone with any checklists or suggestions should please contact me or bring them to the Banquet, and we will incorporate those items into the final document that should be released this summer

30 Ways One Engineer Can Make a Difference

1. <u>Contact a teacher</u> or principal to speak at a local elementary, middle or high school and provide <u>hands-on experi-</u><u>ments</u> relevant to engineering and careers.

2. Enter news of your local activities on the www.eweek.org database and enter your name as a local contact

3. From Jeremy Hubers: Get involved with a volunteer organization such as Habitat for Humanity and represent your engineering chapter with a volunteering spirit.

4. Visit the online <u>Sightseer's Guide</u> to family-friendly engineering-related travel attractions and <u>suggest an interesting</u> <u>landmark</u> or attraction in your community as an addition to the Guide. Suggested sites must be accessible to the general public."

5. Contact the Junior Engineering Technical Society (<u>www.jets.org</u>) to request guidance brochures for various engineering disciplines and explore high school programs.

6. Urge high school and college engineering students to use the current "<u>New Faces of Engineering</u>" as a resource.

7. Visit <u>www.discoverengineering.org</u> and promote this site to middle school students.

8. Write a letter to your local newspaper editor letting him/her know about the importance of engineering to your community or adapt <u>a former Chair's editorial</u> to illustrate examples from your community.

9. Plan a special recognition luncheon in your office and invite the CEO or chief technical officer to participate.

10. Visit <u>www.greatachievements.org</u> for useful information about great engineering achievements of the past 100 years.

11. Donate mystery books with an engineering background, children's books, posters and bookmarks to a local public or school library for an Engineers Week "corner."

12. Visit Connecting the World to Engineering and urge engineering students and young professionals to use the forum to generate interest in Engineers Week.

13. Visit <u>www.nae.edu/awards</u> to learn about the Charles Stark Draper Prize, the "Nobel Prize" of engineering.

14. Organize an extracurricular program for young students, such as a tour or competition. Build spaghetti bridges, race boats or design and build <u>Rube Goldberg</u>-like machines.

15. Develop and maintain a directory of engineering societies or company engineers willing to visit schools, and let schools know this list is available.

16. <u>Organize</u> an Engineers Week Committee with your office or professional society chapter.

17. Organize a walking or bus tour of interesting engineering achievements in the community.

18. Sponsor a workshop to help teachers understand what engineers do.

19. Host a program at a local Boys & Girls Club.

20. Participate in an <u>engineering fair</u> at a local college. Many engineering schools host such fairs during Engineers Week.

21. Create special exhibits in public spaces at your office. Place Engineers Week <u>tent cards</u> on tables in the company cafeteria.

22. Volunteer to serve as a judge for a school science or technology fair.

23. Wear an Engineers Week <u>t-shirt or cap</u>.

24. Send an Engineers Week modem cord winder or water bottle to clients or your children's teachers.

25. Take information from the Engineers Week Internet site on the engineering of <u>chocolate</u>, <u>potato chips</u> and other <u>little-known engineering connections</u> and pass it along to your company newsletter, local newspaper or local school.

26. Help with a local <u>MATHCOUNTS</u> competition that occurs during Engineers Week.

27. Contact a high school guidance counselor. Offer to talk with students and provide <u>Engineering & You brochures</u> or an <u>Engineers Week video</u> for the guidance office.

28. Organize an essay contest for a local class.
