Message from the President

Spring is approaching and with it comes a flurry of activity for our chapter and the entire organization. Most of you are aware of our annual events but many do not realize the "why" and "how" these events came to be. I believe it would be helpful to understand the history of these activities to generate enthusiasm and participation.

In 1916, G.R. Ramsey, City Engineer of Orlando, wrote to J.R. Benton, Dean of the University of Florida, College of Engineering, advocating for the formation of an engineering society. Unlike most organizations, FES started from scratch and did not have a national organization in place. Several engineers like Ramsey realized Florida would be growing rapidly and wanted to make certain all projects involving engineers were done correctly and safely. After the first meeting of FES in Jacksonville, a bill was drafted. This legislation was introduced in the state legislature and in May 1917 it was enacted into law as Chapter 7404 of the Florida Statutes, thus becoming the first all-inclusive engineering licensing law in the nation. In 1934, the National Society of Professional Engineers was formed.

MATHCOUNTS® originated in 1983 as a way **to** heighten interest in mathematics for middle school students by making math challenging and exciting. Incentives for the students include trophies, scholarships and cash. Did you know it takes 17,000 volunteers each year to conduct Mathcounts? The statewide event will take place on March 19th in Orlando this year.

"Creating the Future" is the 2023 theme for Engineers' Week. The purpose of Engineers' Week (or E-Week) is to show how engineers make a difference in our world, boost awareness of our need for engineers, and especially, support and promote activities that get students interested in engineering. Engineers play a vital role in finding innovating solutions to global challenges that impact future generations. By working together to develop new technologies, products and opportunities, engineers create new possibilities that make the world a better place. Let's inspire the next generation by celebrating all the ways engineers Create the Future!

Thank you to those members who made our chapter's fun events possible. The fishing tournament in August and the shrimp boil in January were well received and very successful. Events like these promote camaraderie and help our chapter financially.

This is the time of year we can take special pride in our profession and share that with future engineers. I encourage you to get involved in some of these activities which will enrich you and influence others. I hope to see many of you at the annual Engineers' Week Banquet!




N BETWEEN THE LINES

NSPE Code of Ethics

Engineering is an important and learned profession. As members of this profession, engineers are expected to exhibit the highest standards of honesty and integrity. Engineering has a direct and vital impact on the quality of life for all people. Accordingly, the services provided by engineers require honesty, impartiality, fairness, and equity, and must be dedicated to the protection of the public health, safety, and welfare. Engineers must perform under a standard of professional behavior that requires adherence to the highest principles of ethical conduct.

Fundamental Canons

Engineers, in the fulfillment of their professional duties, shall:

- Hold paramount the safety, health, and welfare of the public.
- Perform services only in areas of their competence.
- Issue public statements only in an objective and truthful manner.
- Act for each employer or client as faithful agents or trustees.
- Avoid deceptive acts.
- Conduct themselves honorably, responsibly, ethically, and law fully so as to enhance the honor, reputation, and usefulness of the profession.
